- ♦ **ORAL HISTORY**—With the help of Linfield College's mass media department, we will be offering a chance for people to share stories about their lives. Visit with an interviewer about one of the following topics: Agriculture, transportation, civic life and commerce, role of women, and daily life at home. Each interview will be limited to 30 minutes. Those sharing will be given a DVD of the interview. We ask that we be allowed to keep a copy for the Historical Society and one copy will be kept by Linfield. This is free to all. 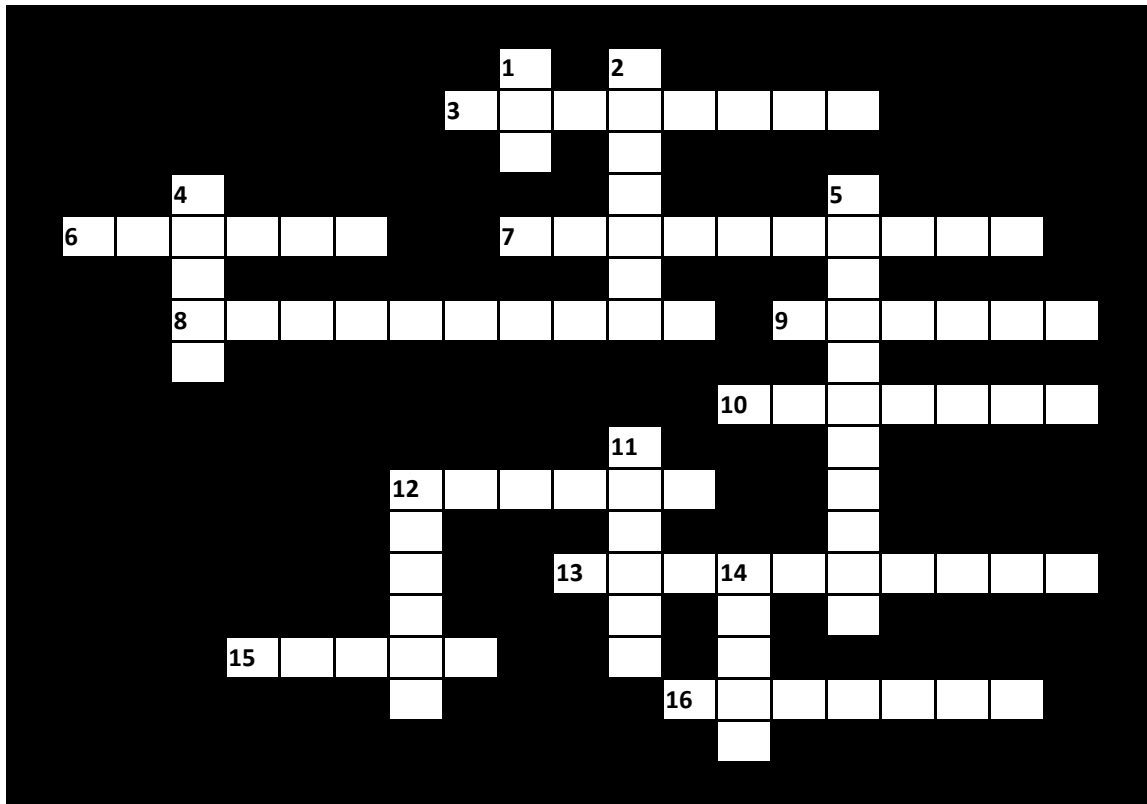

3. Found in Eastern Oregon, these 10,000 year-old ___ are the oldest ___ in the world!
6. Oregon has the largest number of historic covered ___'s in the Western U.S. They were popular in the 19th and early 20th centuries because they extended the life of its deck.
7. Oregon has more than 3,000 of these off the coast giving evidence of the importance of water vessels in early contact, settlement, trade and recreation.
8. Federal work/relief programs during the Great Depression produced many structures that have become symbols of our state like this historic lodge.
9. This trail was the main overland migration route to Oregon from the east from 1841-1869. Ruts are still visible in places.
10. This industry blossomed after 1900 in Oregon fostering towns, camps and rail lines.
12. Known as The ___ Mounds, these massive arrangement of rock walls, cairns, pits, troughs, and alignments hug the contours of the slopes in the Columbia River Gorge. The meaning behind them remains unknown.
13. Nine of these were built along Oregon's coast between 1870 and 1896 and still survive today. Seven are open to the public and your editor was married in one of them.
15. The Tillamook wooden hangar is the largest wooden structure in the world. During WWII, this item was housed in this hanger and escorted commercial ships and protected them from enemy submarines.

16. This famous column built in 1926, celebrates early Northwest history, focusing on events between 1792 and the 1880's.

1. First introduced in the 1860's, ___ farms spread throughout the Willamette Valley. They helped migrant farm laborers survive the Great Depression.
2. Domed rock ovens commonly referred to as "___ Ovens" are the only signs left of the early construction camps along Oregon's railways.
4. This house, a pioneer memorial "Comfort Station" and viewpoint, opened in 1918 providing an observatory to view both up and down the Columbia River.
5. Known as Oregon's Rock Art, these ___ (carved images) are the story boards of past people.
11. These falls, near The Dalles, served as the major trading and fishing center in the region for thousands of years.
12. The oldest-known housesite in Oregon is approximately 9,500 years-old, predating the eruption of this mountain.
14. Excavations on the Oregon Coast revealed remains of a 900 year-old ___ belonging to a Kwatame tribal chief.

Roghair Break Room

Edward Roghair was born on October 28, 1912 in Osceola County, Iowa, the eldest son of thirteen children. At the age of 13, the family moved to Okaton, South Dakota. On June 8, 1941 he married Margaret Alice Bowder. Ed was listed in the Who's Who in South Dakota and in 1956 was named Jones County's Outstanding Young Farmer.

With his wife and school-age family, he moved in 1957 to McMinnville where he was an electrician at Linfield College for 13 years. All of their children (James, Gene, Wallace and Crystal) graduated from McMinnville High School.

Ed was active in many organizations over the years. One of which was the Yamhill County Historical Society where he was a regular docent at the Farm Museum in Lafayette. He served on the Board of Directors from 1981 to 2003. His wife, Margaret, was also active in the Historical

Society. She published the newsletter from 1989 to 1994. Ed always wished for a room where friends could meet, visit and have coffee. With memorials and family donations, a room was set aside in the Restoration Building at the Heritage Center. This room has always been called the "Roghair Break Room."

Ed passed away at the age of 93 and is survived by his wife Margaret.

Last month Ed's son Gene visited McMinnville and the Heritage Center where he was given a tour by Cliff Watts. He really enjoyed seeing machinery related to his growing-up years, especially a tractor just donated by Charlie. He presented a plaque to the society dedicating the break room in Ed's memory. It is in place for all to see.

The plaque inscription: *Roghair Break Room, Remembering Ed. 1912-2006, Honoring Peggy 1916.*

Panic in the Dark

One night I went out in the back yard to get some firewood. The cordwood had been cut up into short lengths and was neatly piled under the trees. In the dim light and faint glow from the dining room windows, the exposed ends of the piled wood suddenly looked like a large number of grinning cat faces, like hundreds of Alice in Wonderland disembodied "chessy" cats. I streaked back to the house in panic. I broke myself of that nonsense when home alone one night by going out and walking through the woods.

However, once when reading Stevenson's

"Kidnapped" far into the night in a large chair in the living room, by a single floor lamp, I sensed something or someone peering over my shoulder from the dark interior of the adjacent dining room. My scalp was creeping. When I looked up, there was a seven foot tall figure hovering over me. It was a dark hat and a large overcoat hanging on an antique coat rack. Years later I gave that coat rack to my son with warnings of its potentials.

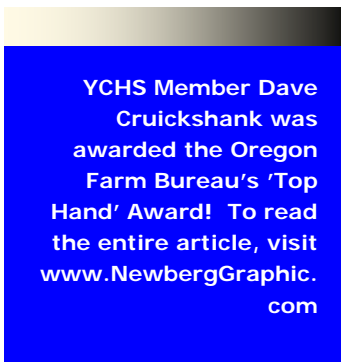
Puckerville, January 21, 1889

We don't see anything of the new store building—where is it? W.B. Holman, of McMinnville, spent Sunday in our berg with his best girl. Mrs. Carl Little has been quite sick, but we are glad to say she is convalescent. Several of our Puckerville dudes went out on a deer hunt last week, but after

being out twenty four hours returned sadder but wiser men.

Puckerville talks of organizing a literary society. Go ahead. Puckerville has more get-up than any other town of its size in Yamhill County.
