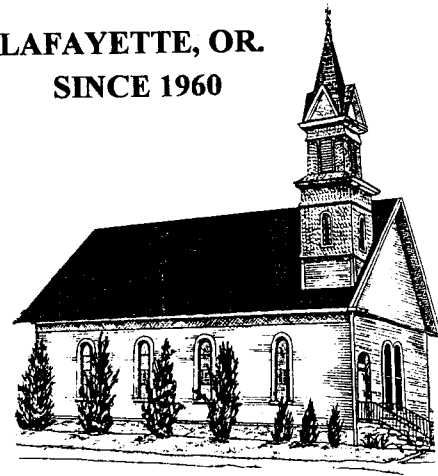

Over 25 ladies and children participated in the rug making class taught by Murrietta Rankin. It seemed right for this type of activity to be held in the Miller Log Museum. Our guests had words of praise for our building and the project. We have some new members as a result! This will be an ongoing project- Murrietta will be present again to help us on Saturday April 1st from 1 to 4 PM.

As a non-profit organization we are required to keep records of our meetings, activities and financial reports. We are missing several of these records from 1993-1994. If anyone has saved these contact Betty White. Please check and see what you have!

Our financial status now and in the upcoming year will have to be carefully studied. We have cashed in our last CD. Our expenses have increased with the new building and additional programs. New memberships are coming in and this helps a little. We have received information on grants that are available but we need someone who would help with the process of requesting them. The following items were published on the front pages of the DAYTON HERALD for the dates indicated and offer a slice of everyday life as it was then in that community (JW)

July 26, 1895

"Those in doubt about Dayton having a telephone line are having their doubts dispelled by the delivery of a large number of telephone poles here and their distribution along the route.

"The Epworth League devotional meeting on Sunday eve, will be led by Mrs. Exon and conducted as a temperance meeting.

March 13, 1896

"On Sunday as J.W. Martin was driving down from Independence, and when a short distance from Amity, one of his horses commenced kicking and became almost unmanageable. At that time R.S. Connor, whom Mr. Martin had passed a few minutes before, arrived on the scene and lent his assistance to control Martin's team. In doing so the horse kicked him on the elbow, knocking the elbow joint out of its socket. At last accounts Mr. Connor was suffering immensely from the injury.

"The latest and best improved carpet stretchers available for sale cheap by I. Nichols.

July 3, 1896

"The steamer Toledo on Tuesday, brought up a load of gravel to be used on the streets of McMinnville. The Gravel will be taken from here to McMinnville (7 mile) by team. Hereafter the Toledo, on her trips up the river will bring a barge load of gravel here, until the required amount contracted to be used on the streets of McMinnville this year is brought up. It now appears that the streets of the capital of Yamhill county are to be made in good condition, and that city instead of being a mud hole will become a beautiful and pleasant city. We commend the enterprise and push of the citizens of our neighboring city, and hope it will become contagious throughout Yamhill county. Good roads and streets thought [sic] the whole county is what is wanted. There is plenty of gravel to make them.

"Eggs nine cents per dozen at the Dayton Market. Kreitz and Wambegan, proprietors.

July 3, 1896

"Those who have promised to bring us wood in payment for subscription, will please do so at as early date as possible. We do not care to wait until the rainy season to receive wood.

April 9, 1897

"Undertaker Fenton is now busy at work completing his fine new hearse which he has been at work for some time. When completed the hearse will be one of the finest and latest style. Dayton can now boast of the best undertaking outfits in this country.

"Nathan Bradley, proprietor of the livery barn now has his hay scales fixed in good shape for business and again offers fair measurement for all.

August 5, 1898

"Nichols and Gabriel the general merchandise dealers of Dayton, keep to the front at all times. They now have two new lady clerks assisting in their store: one is a young lady, and the other a young married woman. We do not wish to criticise (sic) Messrs. N. & G., but we believe the ladies are improving the appearance of the store and making it more attractive by tastefully rearranging the goods.

"J. W. Fishburn will have the honor of putting the first cement sidewalk in this city. He is now constructing a new cement walk along his premises corner of Fourth and Ferry streets. This is a good example for others to pattern after. What fine streets Ferry and Alder could be made by being properly graded and cement walks put in.

September 16, 1898

"The reports of the blasting at Lafayette locks in the Yamhill are heard here frequently during the day. The work is progressing, but will probably not be completed this season.

"J. E. Mellinger has been employed by the Dayton Evaporating Co. to buy fruits for the company. He is posted on fruit, and his knowledge of prunes is unlimited - he is chuck full of them.
