The YCHS has lost a valued friend and talented volunteer with the passing of Al Cronk. His humor and smile will be missed by all who had the privilege to know him, and his dedication and work at our new Heritage Center will be hard to replace. We offer our sincere condolences to his wife, Sandy, and his family.

After achieving our first goal, the Flag Monument at the Heritage Center, we have now entered phase two of the Heritage Brick Program. The funds raised in phase two will be directed towards the construction of concrete pathways and the space around the base of the Flag Monument. These spaces will facilitate those people attending our events or touring the museum who need the assistance of walkers, wheelchairs, or baby strollers. These areas will be in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.


We have now raised a total of \$27,738.97 in our Heritage Brick Program and have a balance (after paying for the Flag Monument) of

Al Cronk was a volunteer who spent a great amount of time helping other volunteers at the Heritage Center. He not only donated his time but his expertise. He was a forester who knew his wood inside and out and could turn a chunk of wood into a piece of art.

You will find many examples of his efforts at the Heritage Center. The big wooden sign out at the corner of Highway 18 and Durham Lane was one of his latest efforts. He was in the process of building benches the McMinnville Garden Club donated to the society. He designed and was in the process of building the large signs that will go out at the entrance to

the museum. The sign that now hangs over the window at the sawmill was done by him. When a vintage John Deere combine



An Excellent Location

A few Reasons Why Amity Is The Best Point In The Valley For The Location of a Flour Mill and a Bank.

Midway between the metropolis and capital, stretching in a westerly direction from the Willamette, lies what is known as the Yamhill Valley, named in honor of the beautiful stream of water which flows through it. This valley lies in the heart of the great Willamette Valley, properly termed, "The Garden Spot of the World," and has been suitably re-named "The Garden Spot of Oregon." It embraces an extensive area of unquestionably the best farming and fruit raising land in the state, and is superior to any other portion of the country in the general conditions of the climate and health.

Along the north side of the Yamhill Valley lie MeMinnville, Yamhill's county seat, and Bellevue, and near the west end is Sheridan and Willamina, all prosperous villages and well located, while along the south side are Ballston, Perrydale and MeCoy, three prosperous Polk county villages, and in a beautiful, healthy and convenient location in the center of this beautifully valley lies our little city, Amity. Surrounded on all sides by ever increasing prosperity, it has a future brilliant even in the most extreme seclusion, and in a picture molded 20 years hence in accordance with the indication of present appearances, who can describe it?

The country surrounding Amity bears yearly a large harvest of all the principle cereals, fruit, hops and ere many years roll by will be turning into market a good average corn erop.

Amity's growth has so far been slow, keeping in pace with the growth of the country and she is today in a better condition and on a more direct road to prosperity than any village in the country.

At Briedwell station one mile east of Amity, on the Southern Paeific railroad is the largest grain shipping point in Yamhill county, and is connected with Amity by a fine graveled road which in the winter is void of mud and always in shape for transportation of the heaviest loads while at Amity proper is also located a large grain warehouse on the Oregon & California railroad, shipping annually a large amount of grain.

The nearest flouring mill is at the county seat on the north edge of the valley which also contains the nearest bank, these two institutions being all there is to draw custom from us, and many farmers living much nearer the county seat as well as other towns near by patronize Amity merchants, on account of their honest, upright dealings and ability to offer better inducements than those of their sister towns and also on account of the condition of the highways leading to our village; no dust in summer nor mud in winter, such a condition not existing for any town near enough to in any way conflict with Amity's progress.

Besides the patronage of our own locality to a mill and a bank here, there would be that of all the afore named villages

except those that have them Sheridan and McMinnville, and the village of Willamina, which is located in a position that Sheridan would receive its trade. All the rest would patronize Amity and if left to appoint the location, would select our city, it being the easiest reached and most centrally located. All but one of these towns handle grain, each having large warehouses and all located on R.R. lines and their patronage would be a grand item.

In the Yamhill Valley are yet thousands of acres of vacant land, of a very desirable character for homeseekers, which though being quite rapidly taken up yet offers grand inducements. Homeseekers coming to view our little village, seldom look farther for a location, being always well pleased with our pleasant and healthy location, brilliant educational facilities and institutions of morality and a genial, accommodation, and progressive class of citizens.

We feel safe in saying that a matter of but a short time lies between now and the advent of a good bank and flour mill for Amity, which will awaken a boom that will cease only when she occupies the position she has long deserved that of the leading city in size, wealth and general ability in Yamhill county, which position she would have held from the beginning but for an over ruling spirit of mossbackism which is now a thing of the past.
